In the Interim by Eric Luedtke, Interim Pastor Making an Impression

Do you ever think about the kind of impression you make on others? Sure, we all do. Some of us may even dwell on what we perceive others have thought about us to the extent that it distracts us from what we are intended to be doing.

Have you ever thought about the kind of impression Jesus made in different places? Think about some of your favorite stories of Jesus' life and consider what kind of impression he makes. In some cases he intends to make a scene (turning the tables in the temple) in other cases he tries to blend into the crowd (check out his initial response to Mary at the Wedding at Cana). Most often Jesus appears in the role of the teacher or healer and seems to catch the attention of those who are gathered.

The St. Peder's Call Committee got a first impression of the candidates for our pastoral opening. I would even guess that different people on the team may have had different first impressions. Often our impression of a person or an experience relates to previous experiences we've had or people we have met. Similarly those candidates all got an impression of St. Peder's from the conversation they've had with our Call Committee.

As the congregation prepares for the arrival of a new pastor – what is the impression you want to make on that pastor? Do you want to extend warmth and hospitality or do you want them to know how much work you put in to welcome them? Do you want them to experience joy and positivity or sadness and stress?

How might this congregation be intentional about making sure the impression we make is the one we want to make? And how might these steps extend beyond the next pastor to anyone who walks through the doors of St. Peder's?

- Are we intentional to greet visitors and learn one interesting thing about them?
- Are we proud of the building where we gather and willing to show people around?
- Do we make it a point to introduce guests to another member with something in common?
- Do we greet children at their level and speak to them directly?
- Are we over-eager to rope guests into serving us in some way?

... and maybe the biggest question of all – we've invited pastors to come and learn about St. Peder's by submitting our Ministry Site Profile – when did we last invite a friend or neighbor to join us at St. Peder's?



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How St. Peder's Is Helping to Support Black Artists

Today I'm going to spend a few minutes talking about the exciting topic of royalties and license fees for music! So Ushers, please lock the doors: no one is allowed to leave.

When our church purchases music, a small amount of what we pay usually goes to the composers or their estates as royalties. When our church pays music licensing fees, which we do in order to print hymns in our bulletin or stream hymns online, a little bit of that fee usually goes to the people who composed the hymns or to their estates. But a lot of hymns and songs that come out of the African American spiritual tradition were written by slaves. Their descendants don't get a penny in royalties or license fees for that music.

A few months ago, there was a story on NPR about this issue. Click <u>here</u> for the story. The story said that some churches are paying money to support black artists when they use African American spirituals.

So, I thought, "why doesn't St. Peder's do something like that?" And we are going to do something like that. Based on recommendations from the Music and Worship Committee and the Racial Justice Team, the church council has approved two one-time donations from the Tabitta Kassen fund to non-profits in north Minneapolis that support African American Artists: \$500 to Hopewell Music, whose mission is to improve access to music education in north Minneapolis; and \$500 to The Capri, a theater organization designed to enrich the skills, prospects and spirit of north Minneapolis area youth and adults.

But we also want to try to develop an ongoing relationship with a non-profit in our neighborhood that supports black artists: Black Table Arts, on Minnehaha Ave. Black Table Arts is a community driven arts cooperative gathering black communities through the arts towards better black futures. Our church will make an initial donation to Black Table Arts of \$250 from the Tabitta Kassen fund. And we will also donate to Black Table Arts the money collected during coffee hour on communion Sundays. On those Sundays, like today, we will include in the service music from the African American tradition or other music by a person of color. Remember to put some money in the basket for coffee today and on every communion Sunday. You'll be helping black artists.


