### In the Interim: Transition is a Process

I often wonder what it would have been like to be one of Jesus original disciples. I am amazed when I read Mark 1:16-20, within four short sentences Jesus has four followers and all he says is "follow me and I will make you fish for people." No idea what the "product" of their time together will be, no idea what the "process" will be, they were just compelled to follow Jesus.

I know that would rarely work in today's age. We want to know what we're getting into, and rightfully so. Our time and resources are valuable and we want to be sure we are investing them wisely. That is why the contemplation and patience of being followers of Jesus feels so counter-cultural. As Christians we are called to trust where the Holy Spirit is leading us. As we continue in the Transition Time together as the church called St. Peder, we know the path we are headed toward is calling a new pastor, but the steps to get there don't always seem obvious.

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On Sunday, June 13 we Installed the Transition Team at our outdoor worship service. The team members: Peter Juhl, Lisa Rovick, Judy Hogan, Casey Clementson, Jeanne Schleh, Gordon Legge, Sue Nielsen, Curt Petersen (in absentia, but present in Spirit) were in full voice as they committed to their work ahead. The congregation was in double-full voice (admittedly there were a few more of them) in supporting the work of the Transition Team.

#### And just what is that work?

In the most concrete terms, the work of the Transition Team is to prepare the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) which is the document the ELCA uses to match possible candidates for Pastor and for those candidates

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to learn about this congregation called St. Peder's. But to complete that document, the Transition Team will be doing a lot of information gathering – some basic demographic data about St. Peder's and our community; conversation with council about what salary and benefits are available to the called pastor; and hearing from the congregation at large to discover Who We've Been, Who We Are, and Who We Are Called to Be.

That last part is the most critical, and seemingly most ambiguous, part of the process. How do we identify such a thing for a congregation older than any of our lifetimes and longer than any of our memories?

Over the next three months we will offer opportunities to gather as a congregation, both inperson and on Zoom, to share our stories around three specific topics:

- 1. **The History of St. Peder's.** Join us in conversation as we share a timeline of St. Peder's and place important events in the life of St. Peder's on the timeline. How has our history shaped Who We Are? How does it root us as a faith community? How does our history inform who God is calling us to become in our community?
- 2. **My Most Meaningful Scripture**. Think about your favorite passage(s) of scripture. What are they? Why are they your favorites? Are they connected to St. Peder's? We'll gather to talk about our rootedness in God's word as a people of faith.
- 3. **Experiences at St. Peder's**. When you think about St. Peder's Church, what are the events that have happened here that have defined this church for you? As we share these events we'll uncover central themes that are core to this congregation and that define the values that hold us together as a church.

We'll take notes from each of these gatherings and the Transition Team will then work to identify the core themes that emerge from our conversations. What do the stories we share say about us as a congregation? How might they inform what kind of pastor might serve us well into the future? Those themes will help the Transition Team complete the Ministry Site Profile that tells a story of who St. Peder's Lutheran Church is and why our next pastor is called to come and serve alongside us as we follow Jesus through the 21st Century.

You can expect to see an invitation to each of these events as we get closer to confirm the details of our gathering and remind you to be part of this important work of the Transition Team. As always, if you have questions about the process, reach out to members of the Transition Team or Pastor Eric, we want to answer your questions and include the whole congregation in this process.

# A Note from St. Peder's Treasurer, Paul Odegaard

Dear St. Peder's community members,

Summer's greetings and blessings of peace to you. I write with a mid-year financial report to provide an update on where we are part way through this fiscal year. With the remarkable effectiveness of the COVID vaccines, and the high likelihood that more normal operations resume later this year, I'm filled with optimism.

Support for St. Peder's this fiscal year has been similar to last year at this point. To date, we've received \$83,149, which is off our projected revenue pace by approximately \$21,000. It is remarkably similar to last year's income at this point (within \$1,500), but this year we do not have the luxury of a PPP loan to assist us in meeting our expected budget at the end of the year. May was the first month of the year that we hit our expected member revenue projection. To date, we've also managed our expenses extremely well, based on our budget of approximately \$120,000, with actual expenses coming in just above \$106,000. That results in an overall projected operating deficit of just over \$7,000 at this point. We are still striving, after careful planning, to succeed on a balanced budget.

I ask today for your continued generosity for St. Peder's. As we look ahead to future outdoor services and the resumption of our regular activities, we will rely on you to maintain our vibrant standing in this community. Please follow up if you have questions or concerns. I'm grateful for your many contributions to St. Peder's.

# St Peder's Selected as Learning Partner with Riverside Innovation Hub By Karen Vetsch - excited member of the learning team

As Pastor Eric has mentioned in the June Messenger our church has joined in a two year learning opportunity with the Riverside Innovation Hub, an initiative of the Christensen Center for Vocation at Augsburg University. This will involve 5 dedicated people (1 staff / 4 members)



from St. Peder's as the core team. Team members will be identified in the coming weeks. This program starts mid July 2021, with introductions and placement of cohort groups with the other 10 churches that joined in this learning opportunity. As our team learns and grows we will share ideas, resources, and tools to help St. Peder's church and community learn how we can be neighborly at the corner of E 4600 42 street and our wider neighborhood.

The following is an overview of the learning opportunity from Riverside Innovation Hub: This partnership will be a significant investment of time, energy and people power. We believe that this investment is worthwhile and needed in order to engage the call to be neighbor today. These next two years will be an apprenticeship in learning how to be and become a public church. A public church is a local congregation active in mutual relationships with its neighborhood and neighbors in ways that promote the well-being and thriving of the larger community. This looks like neighbors experiencing "good news" - Christ's love, resurrection, hope, reconciliation - in ways that truly matter to their daily lives. A public church does this together in its location so its people can also learn to do this in their locations of family, neighborhood, work, etc. The team you build will explore the artforms of the public church framework, learning how to do the work of being neighbor in your location. Your team will participate in large group learning events digging deeper into the ideas, practical steps and challenges of being a public church. Your team will experiment in its geographic context. Your team will share what you are learning and wrestle with the challenges embedded in this work with a cohort of three other congregations. By the end of our two years together your team will have experience, knowhow and imagination to lead your congregation more deeply into its call to be neighbor, in your place.

#### From the Racial Justice Team.....

Each month we will be sharing some thought provoking statements or questions for you to consider. We hope you'll take a few moments to engage your heart and mind while pondering them.

### Something to Ponder.....

You've probably heard of Rosa Parks. You may even know she was credited with refusing to give up her seat to a white man on an Alabama bus in 1955. You may not know that this event helped kick off the Civil Rights Movement and the Montgomery Bus Boycott with the demand that Montgomery busing segregation laws be eliminated. Perhaps you've also heard about Eli Whitney (1765-1825) the African American inventor of the cotton gin. However, you may not know the cotton gin was one of the main inventions of the Industrial Revolution and shaped the economy of the South. And if you've seen the movie Hidden Figures, you know that Katherine Johnson was a mathematician who worked for the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) in 1953, which later became NASA. Katherine became one of the African American "human computers", part of an entire unit of African American women "human computers" at NASA, that did calculations before the invention of computer technology to figure out how to get humans into space. One of the calculations Katherine worked on helped get the Apollo astronauts home from the moon.

These and many other African Americans have played a central role in shaping our nation but they have not consistently been included in our school curriculum and textbooks. The identities of many of the heroes who helped form the American story remain unrecognized, or even actively suppressed. Minneapolis schools have been named after Mary McLeod Bethune. Nellie Stone Johnson, Benjamin Banneker and Richard Green which suggests they've made important contributions but many of us do not know what those contributions are. Fredrick Douglass, Matthew Henson, Carter G. Woodson, Percy Julian, or Fannie Lou Hamer are names you may recognize, but you may not know how they have contributed to our story. The year 1619, the Haitian Revolution, Black cowboys, Black Wall Street, the Tulsa Massacre, and the Harlem Renaissance were significant events but you may not know why. Additionally, African Americans developed our system of blood banks and invented the traffic light, fiber optic cable, touchtone telephone, and mobile refrigeration for transportation of frozen foods, among many other products that are essential in our daily lives. And most recently an African American woman was one of the key scientists behind the Moderna Covid 19 vaccine, but we don't know those stories. We have much to learn about who we are as a nation, with a more complete and honest study of our history including contributions of African Americans and other people of color.

#### Consider:

- What is the impact of learning an incomplete and distorted history in school?
- How does a diverse knowledge of history benefit us?
- Why are these stories not taught in schools and textbooks?
- What history related to people of color are you interested in learning more about?
