In the Interim: The Pendulum of Abiding and Fruitfulness -Pastor Eric Luedtke, Interim Pastor




As we come to the end of summer, many of you have noted that St. Peder's has a tendency to "take the summer off." Many of you have been on vacations, visiting family, spending time at cabins, camping, and enjoying the many joys of summer in Minnesota. It's good to have this opportunity to take a step back and enjoy some time of "sabbath" – we are often reminded

that after 6 days of creation God rested. We're also reminded that throughout the Gospels Jesus takes time away with God.

Through the years I've seen a number of books written about "Sabbath Keeping" – Brennan Manning has a fantastic read called "Souvenirs from Solitude." Walter Brueggemann has a challenging title "Sabbath as Resistance." Marva Dawn wrote "Keeping the Sabbath Holy." Each of these authors (and others) have lifted up the reality that in our 24/7-information-now-work-harder-world we often overlook the need to take intentional time away from work.

Of all the models I've read or heard about, the one that sticks with me comes from Mike Breen who developed 3DMinistries. In 3DM, Breen uses basic geometric shapes to explain the life of discipleship. Ultimately Breen's goal is that one can do evangelism (sharing the good news of Jesus) by drawing these shapes on a napkin while out at a coffee shop or a bar and explaining the life of discipleship to others.



The shape that Breen uses to talk about sabbath keeping is the semi-circle. He talks about it as a pendulum motion – like a grandfather clock – the pendulum is always in motion from one place to another. We can never exist in the "rest"

or the "work" we are called to move between these times. In that motion we experience times of growing and pruning. Using John 15:1-8 as an underlying text, we notice the metaphor that Jesus uses saying "I am the vine, you are the branches" and we contemplate that fruit grows in its season, not year 'round.

It has been lovely to see some of you and your kids at our outdoor services and we hope to see more of you as we begin to gather again this fall and when you feel comfortable attending!

We invite all families to attend a special service and event on Rally Sunday, Sunday, September 12! Following the service, we will have food, an obstacle course with prizes, and some other family-friendly games on the lawn. Additionally, we encourage children to bring their backpacks to the service for a special "blessing of the backpacks" as they head back into a new school year. We are asking everyone to wear a mask indoors to protect those among us who are most vulnerable or unable to get vaccinated, including children. We hope you can join us for a fun celebration!

We have recently convened a special Parent's Council to help make decisions around Faith Formation for youth and children for this fall and going forward. If you would like to join this Parent's Council, please reach out to Shawna Nelsen-Wills at shawn-anelsen3@gmail.com. We'd love to have more parents join this team! The Parent's Council is organizing fall Faith Formation for kids and beginning to plan and reimagine what Faith Formation will look like going forward and what we hope to see in a youth leader/program at St. Peder's for 2022 and beyond!

For Faith Formation, given the Delta-variant and the fact that kids under the age of 12 are not yet able to be vaccinated, the Parent's Council voted to continue Zoom Faith Formation for at least September and October--especially with kids returning to school and the unknown effect this will have on rates among children and the community. We will continue to meet and make recommendations based on current data. We will offer Faith Formation twice a month as provided in Spring. (First Zoom will be on Sunday, September 26 at 11:30 a.m.--a more detailed schedule will be sent out in September.) Special Faith Formation bags will be provided to kids on Rally Sunday who would like to participate in Faith Formation this fall--whether you join Zoom or not! Bags can be delivered or picked up for those unable to attend Rally Sunday. Faith Formation will be interactive, fun, and focus on some of the classic stories and lessons from the bible. We are planning for a Christmas Pageant as well for December! We also encourage families to attend church together on the first Sunday of the month as you are comfortable doing so.

To help us get a sense of how many kids and what ages will be a part of our Children/Youth Faith Formation, please register your children and youth, ages 3 to 18, by clicking here. Each month we will be sharing some thought provoking statements or questions for you to consider. We hope you'll take a few moments to engage your heart and mind while pondering them.

Something to ponder...

Reimagining Public Safety/Policing, City Government, and Rental Ordinances
This fall Minneapolis ballots will include several proposed amendments to change the City
Charter. Posed as questions, these amendments will require us to vote either yes or no.

One amendment, a citizen petition by "Yes 4 Minneapolis", relates to public safety and allows city residents to vote on whether or not to replace the Minneapolis Police Department with a new Department of Public Safety.

A second amendment on government structure was proposed by the Charter Commission, a group of unelected members appointed by the courts. The intent of this amendment is to better define and delineate the roles of Mayor as executive and the City Council as the legislative body.

A third amendment, proposed by City Council, relates to rent stabilization. It will allow the Council to either enact a rent control ordinance on private residential property or put such an ordinance up for vote in the future. If voters approve this amendment, a rent control ordinance will not go into effect, but approval will allow the Council to pursue such an ordinance.

There have been ongoing changes to the amendments. It will be important for us as voters to educate ourselves, review the history of their development, and follow updates in order to cast knowledgeable votes. To learn more about the amendments review the references below.

Consider.....(If you are not a Minneapolis resident consider the impact of these changes on our church community or within your city.)

- What functions are necessary for a public safety department? Violence prevention? Mental health? Social Services? Other teams necessary for public health and safety? Would police be involved? If so how?
- What are the current roles of mayor? City council? How is it working? How do the police interface with the mayor? City Council? How is it working? How would a restructured form of government with an Executive Mayor and legislative council improve Minneapolis City Government?
- How available and affordable is housing in Minneapolis, particularly for working families? How would ability to control rents on private residential property impact affordability? What is the opposition to rent control on private residential property?



RIVERSIDE Updates from the Riverside Innovation Hub (RIH) Team

We participated in a two day (ZOOM) kick-off event. Some of the goals were to build a sense of community among participants, learn about the Public Church Framework, and why this work matters. We meet our

three cohort churches along with the eight other churches participating in this journey. St. Peders will be working closely with Immanuel Lutheran of St. Paul, Gustavus Adolphus Lutheran of St. Paul and First Covenant of Minneapolis. Our facilitator is Jennifer Starr Dodd from Riverside Innovation Hub. The next task for our team is a neighborhood prayer walk. We will explore, feel, pray as we walk within the St. Peders neighborhood. Our team will discuss and map out what we learned and felt as we walked. For example, where did we feel excitement, joy, energy, sadness, fear, emptiness. Together as a team we hope to gather a sense of our neighbors and the space we share with them. Later in September we will meet up with our facilitator and cohort churches to go over our findings and experiences.

Stock Donation is Good Way to Give by Deb Wolking, Accounts Manager

Donating stock to St. Peder's can be a good way to give to the church. There's the obvious benefit to St. Peder's as well as a potential tax advantage for the giver. By making a donation of stock, people can avoid paying capital gains tax they might incur by selling the stock for cash. It is always best to talk to your financial advisor regarding your specific situation. St. Peder's has an account with Merrill Lynch to receive stock donations. It is our policy to sell all stock as soon as it is received.

One issue that has caused problems when making donations is the difference between stocks and Exchange Traded Funds (ETFs) as opposed to mutual funds. They are processed through different systems. Stocks and ETFs are transferred through the DTC system using a processing number 886, and mutual funds are transferred through the ACAT system which uses the number 0617.


