# Caring for Creation-Minneapolis Synod's EcoFaith Network



Responding to God's call to serve the earth and care for it, the EcoFaith Network (EFN), an initiative of the Minneapolis Area Synod of the ELCA, was created to equip individuals and faith communities in becoming 'watershed disciples' by: developing a network of earth-stewards, promoting education to grow awareness of care for the environment, and identifying opportunities for advocacy in public policy, community action and individual change.

On February 8, Sue Nielsen and Jeanne Schleh represented St. Peder's at the EFN Power Up Event at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Bloomington for 4 hours of learning and networking focusing on water as one of the key issues related to climate change. We all broke into our watershed districts to learn more about how our actions affect water quality on the neighborhood level. We learned the biggest single polluter is salt commonly used in de-icing. Just 1 teaspoon of salt impairs 5 gallons of water. Once water is impaired, it can only be restored through reverse osmosis, an impossible task for ground water.

Did you know St. Peder's is in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District? That means whatever enters our storm drains goes directly to Minnehaha Creek and on to the Mississippi. Right now, Minnehaha Creek, running from Lake Minnetonka to the river, is already impaired, as is Brownie Lake, the smallest lake in the chain, and the other lakes are considered at risk.

What can we do? For starters, use far less salt for de-icing. Many people erroneously think that more is better when, in fact, a mug of salt is sufficient for a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Better yet, avoid salt altogether: many people use grit and sand instead.

Whatever substance is used, once it has accomplished its purpose and the ice is melted, sweep it up to prevent it getting into the storm sewers (this also saves money, since it can be used again the next time ice forms).

Another great individual action: adopt a storm drain! Go to: adopt-a-drain.org, find the storm drain nearest to you and sign up! See the church bulletin board for more details.

On a more theological level, EFN has created a series for Lenten reflection called "Nurturing Life in the Waters of Creation." # A Green 2020 by Judy Hogan

In the February Messenger I shared with you several reasons to recycle/compost. Did you know that recycling also saves energy? It takes 90 percent less energy to manufacture an aluminum can from recycled aluminum, about 50 percent less energy to manufacture a glass bottle from recycled glass, and about 75 percent less energy to manufacture paper from recycled paper. Recycling decreases our demand on fossil fuels and increases our energy independence. The St. Peder's Green Team that brought us curbside recycling/composting a while back did a good job of setting us up for successful recycling. We have well-labeled bins in the kitchen to properly collect all our waste. We also have recycling bins in the church office. Now it is up to each of us to become more aware of our waste management habits and do our part.

#### **General Recycling Tips:**

- Items placed in recycle bins should be empty of their original contents and reasonably clean.
- Generally, separate paper labels from bottles and cans before recycling. Don't worry about getting all
  the paper off, small bits are accounted for in the materials recovery process.
- Don't recycle anything smaller than a credit card even if the material says it's recyclable. The equipment used to sort recyclables isn't designed for small items. These items either fall through the equipment and get mixed with sorted glass, or they jam the equipment
- Check each item for information about it's "recyclability." Don't assume that because something is a
  specific color or texture that it is recyclable. Also, don't believe all printing on an item. Some things are
  printed with "blank" recycling symbols (i.e. no number) just for marketing purposes. Same is true for
  "compostable" or "green" claims.

#### What to Recycle:

- Glass food and beverage containers (any color). Remove plastic and metal covers and place in trash (if they are smaller than a credit card).
- Metal food and beverage cans
- Milk cartons and juice boxes
- Boxboard (cookies, crackers, and pasta boxes, shoe boxes, electronic and gift boxes, boxes from toothpaste and medications, etc.)
- Mixed paper, including mail, Sunday School and office papers, newspaper (including supplements), magazines, brochures and catalogs.
- Corrugated cardboard
- Plastic bottles, containers and lids, that display the recycling symbol and numbers 1, 2 or 5. Keep plastic lids screwed onto bottles. Remove paper labels.

#### More background about plastics:

-While China's decision to no longer buy number 5 plastics from outside their borders has drastically decreased the market for number 5, most plastics recyclers are still accepting them. Minneapolis curb-side recycling will accept plastic items labeled 1 through 5. Coffee cup lids and other food service items such as bowls, cups, plates, utensils and take out containers are often made from number 6 plastic. They are NOT recyclable at St. Peder's nor at Minneapolis curb-side recycling.

#### What to Compost (think of this as recycling organic items!):

- Soiled napkins.
- Coffee Grounds, broken or stale treats and other food items not suitable for serving.
- Food left uneaten on plates
- Wilted flowers and other vegetable matter
- Used paper towels with limited amounts of cleaning chemicals (i.e. from drying hands or whipping off a
  wet counter).

#### What to place in Trash Bin:

- Paper towels soiled by cleaning chemicals (such as the spray used to clean tables/counters).
- Plastics without the recycling symbol (or with the symbol and numbers 3. 4. 6 or 7).
- Broken glassware, dishes, pots and pans or utensils. Even clear glass tumblers often have special coatings/treatments that don't do well in the recycling process.
- Plastic wrap and/or bags (or take the bags to a grocery store to recycle them). Chip bags that appear as metal, but are really shiny plastic!
- General office supplies, automotive or household materials (i.e. it would be nice if we could recycle the
  metal in a broken stapler, but at this time it isn't possible through our recycling process).

Waste recycling is still a fairly new frontier, and the rules do change from time-to-time. If you have questions about what is recyclable, or why an item is not recyclable, please contact Judy Hogan at <a href="mailto:right-square">2judyhogan@gmail.com</a> or 612-722-7111.

Greetings! I wanted to write a quick note in this month's Messenger so folks are aware of all the different ways we communicate St. Peder's news and events. If you have any questions, need help accessing one of these resources or want to add your name to an email list or snail mist list, you can call or email me in the office: Jeannie Farrell, Office Coordinator Office Phone: 612-722-8000 Office Email: office@stpeders.org. Also, keep in mind that if you need to stop by, I am usually in the office on Tuesdays and Thursday until 2 or 3.

- -Instant Church Directory: The church directory is available to members of St. Peder's. This is an online resource, but Jeannie can print you a hard copy of the directory. In the directory you will find members contact info including phone, email, shepherding group and address. To use the directory on your computer, go to www.instantchurchdirectory.com and create a login and password and follow the directions from there. To use on your phone, ipad or kindle, download the app from the App Store (Apple), Google Play (Android) or Amazon's Appstore (Kindle). Contact Jeannie if you have problems setting this up.
- -Messenger: This is our monthly newsletter. You can get the newsletter 3 ways— by snail mail, email or picking up a copy at church. Newsletter submissions are due in the middle of the month, usually between the 15th-18th. To change how you receive the newsletter, contact Jeannie in the office.
- -Email Blasts: We use MailChimp to send out periodic email blasts. There are several different email groups: Members (funeral notifications, misc. communications, for example, when our phones were down this summer, closings due to weather), Volunteers (the volunteer schedule and volunteer conflict forms get sent out quarterly to this group) Messenger (the monthly newsletter is sent out to this group), Pub Theology (Shannon sends out topics, dates) and Children/Youth Family (monthly update from Shannon, volunteer help, Peace Camp sign up, and CYF events and announcements.)
- -Sunday Bulletin—Events and announcements for the current and upcoming weeks can be found in the back of the weekly bulletin. These are only available at church on Sunday. If you have an event or announcement that you would like included, please send one week before you would like it to appear in the bulletin.
- -Bulletin Board—this is located right out side the church office. On this board, you can find events happening at St. Peder's and also in our community. A copy of the current month's volunteer schedule, Meals on Wheels schedule and monthly meeting minutes and financial reports of the Council can also be found here. Keep in mind that the Jeannie has the most updated copy of the volunteer schedule on her desk (updated as members call in to sub or switch volunteer shifts)
- -Volunteer Binder The volunteer binder can be found in Fellowship Hall. The binder has lists of volunteers, volunteer coordinators and volunteer position descriptions. Keep in mind, the most updated copy of the volunteer schedule is on Jeannie's desk.

The biggest part of the renovation is the townhomes, which will be renovated two or three units at a time. By donating moving supplies, you can help keep the stress low for families as they are temporarily relocated during the renovation. They are currently seeking: Moving Boxes (90 small, approx. 16"x12"; 75 medium, approx. 12"x22"; and 60 large, approx. 22"x22"), TV Moving Boxes (6 boxes), Wardrobe Boxes (6 boxes), Mattress Bags (Twin/Full/Queen, up to 20) Packing Tape, Bubble Wrap, Packing Paper/Newspaper. Packing Foam, Stretch Wrap, General Cleaning Supplies, Full-Sized Personal Care Products (Shampoo, Conditioner, Shower Gel, etc.), Journals and Pens for Moms and Kids. Please drop off all moving supplies in the marked bin at St. Peder's and Shawna Nelsen-Wills will drop them off to Emma Norton as they come in. Thank you for your support.
